Readings, ALL IN ENGLISH TRANSLATION, will include Aeschylus's Oresteia trilogy, Sophocles' Oedipus plays, Euripides Medea, and the Electra plays from all three tragic authors. No prior knowledge of Greek literature or culture is expected, and the chief aim of the course is for students to learn to interpret and derive meaning from the plays (can be used as a FOMY elective).
